Breathing	Not breathing     Trouble breathing	<ul> <li>Wheezing (whistling or squeaking sound when breathing)</li> <li>Gets winded (short of breath) more easily with very little activity</li> <li>New cough or cough that will not go away</li> <li>Coughing up blood or green or yellow mucus (a jelly-like substance)</li> <li>Trouble breathing when lying down</li> </ul>
Fever/chills or infection		<ul> <li>Fever of 100.4 °F (38 °C) or higher, when taking temperature by mouth</li> <li>Shaking chills (temperature may be normal)</li> <li>Cold symptoms (runny nose, watery eyes, sneezing, coughing)</li> <li>Pain or burning while urinating (peeing)</li> </ul>
