Presentations & Speakers

The Immigrant Health and Cancer Disparities Service sponsored a series of talks in the first quarter, including the following:

Carlos Javier Gonzalez, MFA, Director of Linguistic and Cultural Responsiveness for IHCD, presented *What Did My Doctor Say? Interpreting and Medical Outcomes* as part of the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences Grand Rounds in January.

Funding Updates

We are pleased to share that we received two grants from the Greater New York City Affiliate of Susan G. Komen for the Cure, Inc. to fund AMBER (Arab American Breast Cancer Education and Referral Program) and PRIME (Promoting Immigrant Minority Equity in Cancer Research). AMBER, funded through the Community Breast Health Grants Program for the past five years, increases the utilization of breast cancer risk reduction strategies, early-detection services, and treatment completion among Arab American women in Brooklyn, Queens, and Staten Island. PRIME, funded through the Clinical Research Enrollment Grants Program, will increase enrollment of minorities in cancer observational studies and clinical research.

Health Fair

On February 19, IHCD partnered with the Fouta Union and Med Guinea to bring free health screenings, health information, and referrals to the Fulani-speaking community of New York. Because of the efforts of several volunteers and organizers, 95 participants were seen that day. Since the event, we have been following up with participants to help them access the healthcare system.

Cancer Portal Project

The Cancer Portal Project addresses the social and economic barriers to cancer treatment experienced by underserved cancer patients to improve outcomes. It continues to make a significant difference in the lives of the patients it directly assists, and in the lives of countless others, through its information sharing and training activities. Our next Immigrant Cancer Care Access Network (ICCAN) meeting will be on April 20, 9:00 to 11:00 AM, on the 9 floor (Conference Room 917B) of the Evelyn H. Lauder Breast Center. These meetings provide an opportunity to bring together community-based organizations, cancer advocacy groups, and cancer service providers to collectively problem solve around cancer health disparities. South Asian Health Initiative (SAHI)

SAHI is a multidisciplinary community-academic partnership that focuses on community-based research, education, and service to reduce health disparities faced by the South Asian community. Over the winter, SAHI became a new partner, providing health expertise, in the establishment of the first Community Center in Jackson Heights for South Asians. Other partners include Chhaya CDC, South Asian Council for Social Services, SAYA!, Adhikaar, and India Home. In February, SAHI hosted a health fair in concert with South Asian Youth Action (SAYA!). We look forward to working with the community this Spring to deliver additional free health screenings.

Food to Overcome Outcomes Disparities (FOOD)

The FOOD program is expanding its hospital-based pantry project to identify and address food insecurity among patients with cancer.

Our newest pantry is at the Ralph Lauren Center for Cancer Care and Prevention (RLCCCP). RLCCCP is a community-based center for the prevention, diagnosis, and treatment of cancer. It uses new models of patient care, research, education, and outreach designed to address the unique needs of the community. The work of RLCCCP, a MSKCC partner, is made possible by generous support from the Ralph Lauren Corporation. RLCCCP recently welcomed a new CEO, Gina Villani, MD, MPH, a board-certified medical oncologist, hematologist, and internist. Dr. Villani has a long history of working with underserved communities and addressing health disparities.

The FOOD program will soon be expanding to additional hospitals in Queens and Brooklyn. The FOOD program has benefited greatly from the dedication of the interns and the volunteers who help connect patients with much-needed food during cancer treatment. VENTANILLA DE SALUD (HEALTH WINDOWS)

CIHCD works closely with the Ventanilla de Salud (Health Windows) program at the Mexican Consulate. The Ventanilla

was designed to improve the health of, and strengthen disease prevention activities with, Mexican families living in the United States. MSK's CIHCD and the Mexican Consulate run joint health fairs at the Consulate and throughout NYC. Participants receive free blood pressure, cholesterol, and glucose screenings. In addition, targeted counseling, information about health care services, and linkages to primary care providers are offered. Program for Medical Interpreting Services and Education (PROMISE)

PROMISE, funded by the Robin Hood Foundation, trains unemployed or underemployed individuals, including veterans and the disabled, in medical interpreting and job skills, and assists them to find jobs. To date we have conducted six cycles of training and will soon complete cycles 7 and 8. We have placed, in part- or full-time jobs, over 80 percent of those from cycles 1, 2, and 3 and we are now in the process of placing graduates from cycles 4, 5, and 6. Our students are trained to provide Spanish, Mandarin, and Russian medical interpreting.

The first program of its kind in New York City, PROMISE seeks to alleviate poverty and contribute to diminishing ethnic and racial disparities in health through training in medical interpreting. For further information, please contact us at max@mskcc.org.

Arab Health Initiatives AMBER (Arab American Breast Cancer Education and Referral program)

The AMBER program is continuing to expand. In the spring we will be starting a formal monthly Arabic language support group for women diagnosed with breast cancer, which will consist of both education and psychosocial support to help women and their families cope with a cancer diagnosis.

In addition to our ongoing workshops, AMBER staff have been working hard to help women get screening mammograms in the face of New York State budget cuts in limiting free screening mammograms. We have partnered with the Breast Examination Center of Harlem and are working closely with our partner hospitals to bring these necessary services to the Arab American community.

Colorectal Cancer Screening
